### Chairman's Chat

Hello and welcome to the latest newsletter. The first couple of times I wrote for the newsletter, I used the word 'busy' and it has now become extremely clear that for the chairman and the committee it is always busy. What this means is that the committee and I must prioritise our work, to try to make sure things get done.

Much of the last couple months has been spent pulling together the new season, details of which Jen has already divulged on the front cover of this newsletter, but I think she and her team should be congratulated on producing a varied and challenging season. I, like the rest of you, am looking forwrd with anticiption to hearing the first half of the season announcement in early July.



Since the last newsletter we have seen a studio sell-out with Sue Downing's beautifully directed Northern couple 'Elsie and Norm' and the fabulous 'Glorious' in the main house. The quality of direction, staging and performances just shows the strength in depth we have as a company, which, although small, is extremely talented. Lighting, sound, staging and costume are all of an equally high standard and, as those

who mingle with the audience in front of house roles will tell you, they are frequently highly commended by our audience. Well done to everyone on both productions. As for 'The Vicar of Dibley', well, at the time of writing, it is already sold out with three weeks to go.

Your committee resisted the temptation to offer a full-scale extra performance, but we did decide that offering a preview night for 60 lucky customers would ensure that our members and friends would not miss out on what will be a fun night, and already this preview evening is nearly half full. It also has the added bonus of giving the cast an audience, which so many shows need. This is not something that would be right for every show, but there clearly is a place for it.



One of the most important jobs coming up is the planning of the summer remedial work and I shall be meeting with Keith to decide what are the most immediate requirements for us to complete in the Summer recess following the clear out weekend on 27th/28th July. One area that is ahead of the game is the props department, as Helen and Ros have been doing sterling work. Unfortunately, neither of them is available on clear out day, but the cataloguing and tidying is not finished, so if this is something you would like to get involved with, please get in touch with either of them, as that work will continue throughout the

I cannot stress how important clear out day is to the overall running of the society. I know everyone tries to keep things in order, but we do all fall short from time to time and things do get disorganised very quickly, so the once yearly clear out helps us to at least start the new season on the right foot. If you can spare some time on either or both days, we really do need your help.

There have been many things discussed by your committee over the last few months, but one that may be of interest is the importance of outside lets for the theatre going forward. For those who are relatively new to the company, outside lets are the one and two-night shows, often music acts, which we try to weave into our busy calendar throughout the year.



These "pro-shows" serve two main purposes: firstly to open our doors to a different audience, whom we hope to attract to our own shows, and secondly to raise revenue to ensure that we can continue to operate a financially sound business. We all know that making money is not the be all and end all of the society, but they have for several seasons been the difference between making a profit rather than a loss on our balance sheets.

In reality, they have enabled us to do infrastructure work, such as the installation of the air-conditioning system, without having to use the capital reserves we are required to maintain. Of course, "pro-shows" do not come without their pitfalls. We are legally required to provide front of house staff and some production support including lighting and sound. These shows are often on weekends, when many of us, myself included, have other commitments, so we are extremely grateful to those members who do support these events, because they are increasingly important to the running of the theatre. It is a fine balance and it easy to overstretch our resources, so from the start of 2020, we have agreed to limit the number of outside lets to an average of 10-15 shows per calendar year, split evenly over that period.

### News from the committee

#### Meetings are a bit like this ...

Your committee plays an important role in keeping the theatre ticking over in lots of areas, looking after the nuts and bolts that keep the theatre functioning. Here are a few of the decisions made recently - it may not seem terribly exciting news but you can't say you weren't told!!



We are changing the allocation of the disabled car parking bays to a number system 1,2,3,4 rather than the rather shoddy white board notice which is difficult to read, especially on dark nights and when rain has washed the name away!

The booking system will be the same and will be recorded in the folder, but patrons will be allocated a number printed on a ticket. This will be posted to them with their tickets and we will ask them to display it next to their blue badge.

We will have numbers on the wall and painted on the floor. This might ease CARPARKGATE situations that all Duty Managers know and love!

Not foolproof but we can try.

In an effort to encourage FOH staff for Pro Show nights we are trialling a scheme for the next season to award Double points for these nights. We acknowledge that many shows are at the weekend.

It was decided that Studio nights only needed two stewards but that having a third steward on some nights would be a good opportunity for training.





Following comments on the general upkeep and appearance of the office/kitchen/cloakroom area the following suggestions were made:

The office will keep lost property which has been handed in during shows in a container near the box office counter for a period of three months. We have been asked NOT to accept any garments or items as donations for wardrobe or props. Approximately every three months Natalie will recycle/throw out/send to charity shop any clothes, books, false teeth and limbs, tins, food containers, canteens of cutlery and cuddly toys etc. Could you please therefore label any tins or plates that you bring food in for teas/after show parties etc.

All food for personal use or props must be labelled. We will assume that any food left in the kitchen or fridge is available for general consumption (always grateful for leftover cake and biccies.) If it's past its 'use by date' it will be binned.

A big plea from Natalie – WASH YOUR CUPS! IF YOU DON'T KNOW HOW, PUT THEM IN THE DISHWASHER!

Another area to keep an eye on is the Green Room. This is a heavily used area for rehearsals, KRYPT and studio plays. Please can you endeavour to clear out all your props and costumes and other debris at the end of your usage of the room.

N.B. directors - PLEASE CHECK.



Did anyone notice anything unique on the set of 'Glorious'?

No, not the wonderful floral displays or the amazing birds, but something else. In Florence's drawing room there were two paintings hanging on the wall. (See the arrows to the left.)

For those of you unfamiliar with the history of the society, the Rose Theatre was named after Kenneth Rose, who was an accomplished artist and held exhibitions at some of the leading galleries in the UK. These two paintings are Kenneth Rose originals.

It is good to see us maintaining the history of the theatre in such an innovative way.

### Techie Talk

#### Amy Baker & Andrew Davie



Stepping into the role of Technical Managers for the theatre mid-season was not an easy task. We realised how limited we are when it comes to finding both designers and operators for upcoming productions. This last season some of the productions were only able to go ahead thanks to acting members and one new member - a media student with no previous experience in theatre - successfully taking on these roles.

With our new season announced the situation is no different to previous seasons, with only the same few members needing to cover the design and operation of productions one after another. Therefore, there is an urgent need for all members to consider whether they can help. Shows cannot run without lighting and sound operators - it's as simple as that.

For any members not cast in a part or other members interested in getting involved the requirements are not technically complicated and you will be working alongside directors,

actors and stage managers in creative support roles essential to putting on a show.

As a lighting or sound operator the task during a performance, when everything is set up, is in effect simply pressing one button, but you are doing so in tune with the performance on the stage and in tune with the actors - a sensitivity and understanding of timing gained during the rehearsal period and under the direction of the designer. You are following the script with lighting or sound cues marked in and you are in communication with the stage manager, who also has the cues written in his / her script. In terms of time, the minimum commitment is a couple of weeks of rehearsals plus the performance week, but you are welcome to sit in at any of the rehearsals from the start of the production, both to enjoy the process and gain familiarity with the play.

We hope to finish the re-organisation of the props room over the closed season and would like to ask for volunteers on clear out weekend.

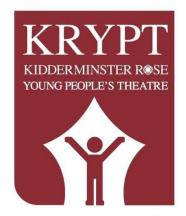
Our aim is to catalogue all the props so that everyone knows at a glance what we have or have not got.

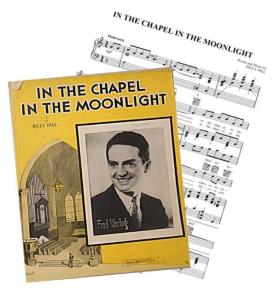
